

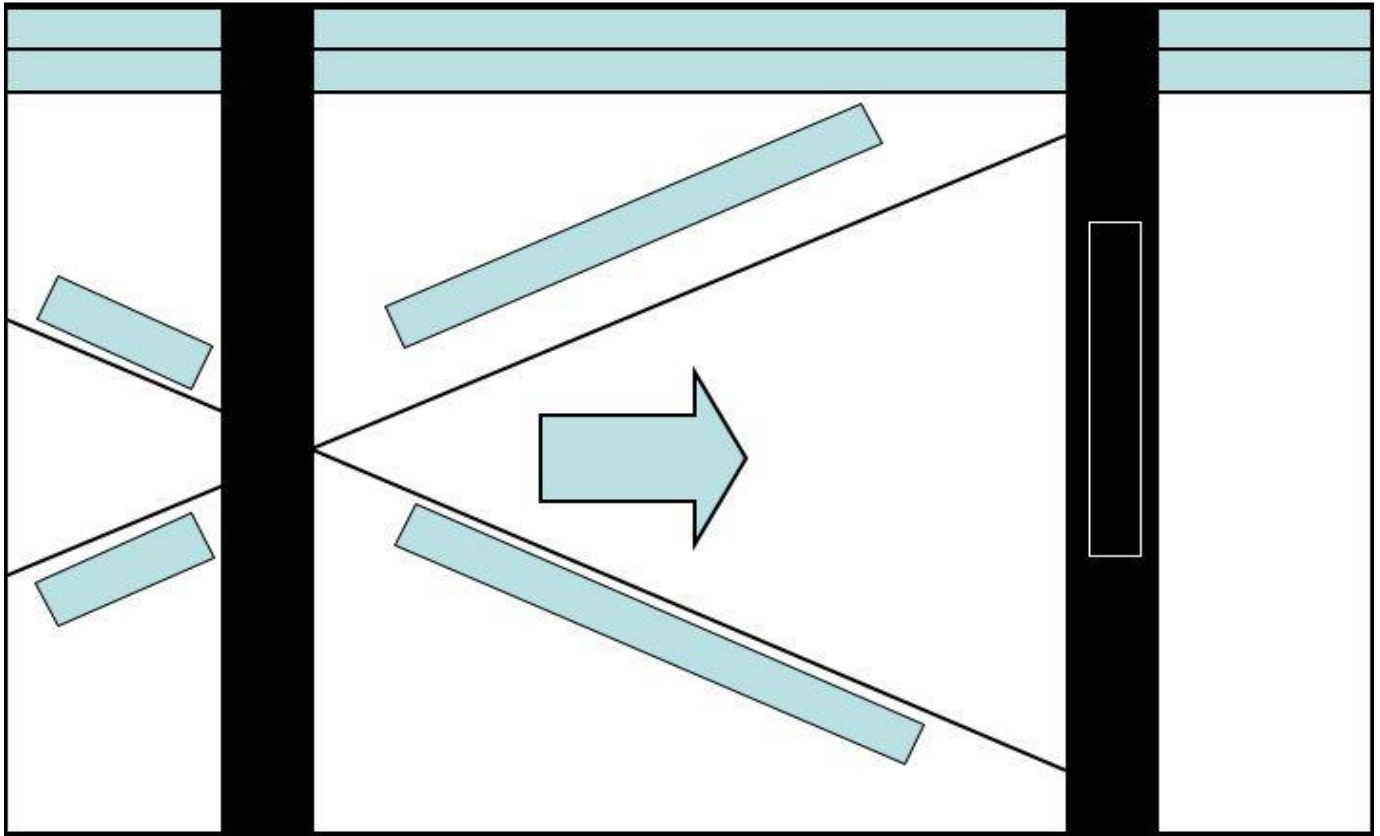

Lesson 1

Introduction to Cross Chart



Introduction:

Crossing. The Christian life is all about a series of **Crossings**. The very act of repenting of our sins giving our life to Christ is one of **Crossing** over...from Death to Life...from Old Life to New Life. How was this salvation made possible? Jesus made a **Crossing**. He crossed from the comforts of fellowship with His Father in heaven, to reach down to save sinners like us. He made the ultimate sacrifice on the **Cross**. And how do we respond? We receive this Jesus and his **Crossing** on our behalf. We then **Cross** through our New Life's challenges with Him. And through it all, we look forward to the hope of **Crossing** into Ultimate Life—Life in Heaven with our Lord Jesus. To more fully understand this theme of **Crossing**, we will use the *Crossing Chart* as a model.

A 'model' is a visual description of a system of components that all connect to, relate to and/or depend on one another. In this study we will be looking systematically at God's relationship with man through the "The Crossing Chart" model. This 8 lesson study will be used to dissect this model and take a more in-depth look at each of its components. This is similar to how you might look at the human body by first looking at the skeleton, then muscles, organs, and finally skin. Our desire is that by the end of this study, like the human body, you might see how each component of the **Crossing Chart** works together with every other component to form this amazing truth called the Gospel.

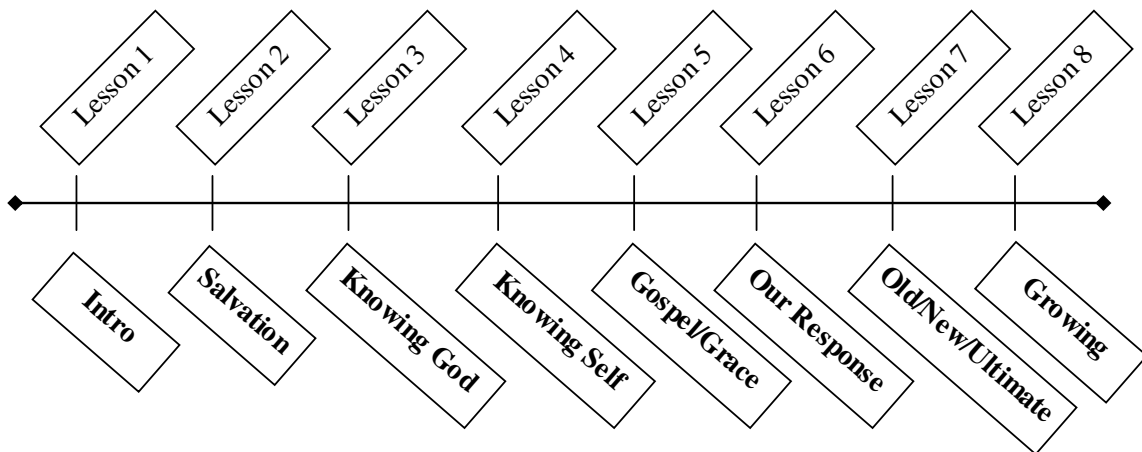

Salvation

Introduction:

Salvation for the Christian is the introduction into NEW LIFE! It is the starting point in a journey of relating with God that will one day culminate into “fullness of joy” and “pleasures forever” in heaven (Psalm 16:11). 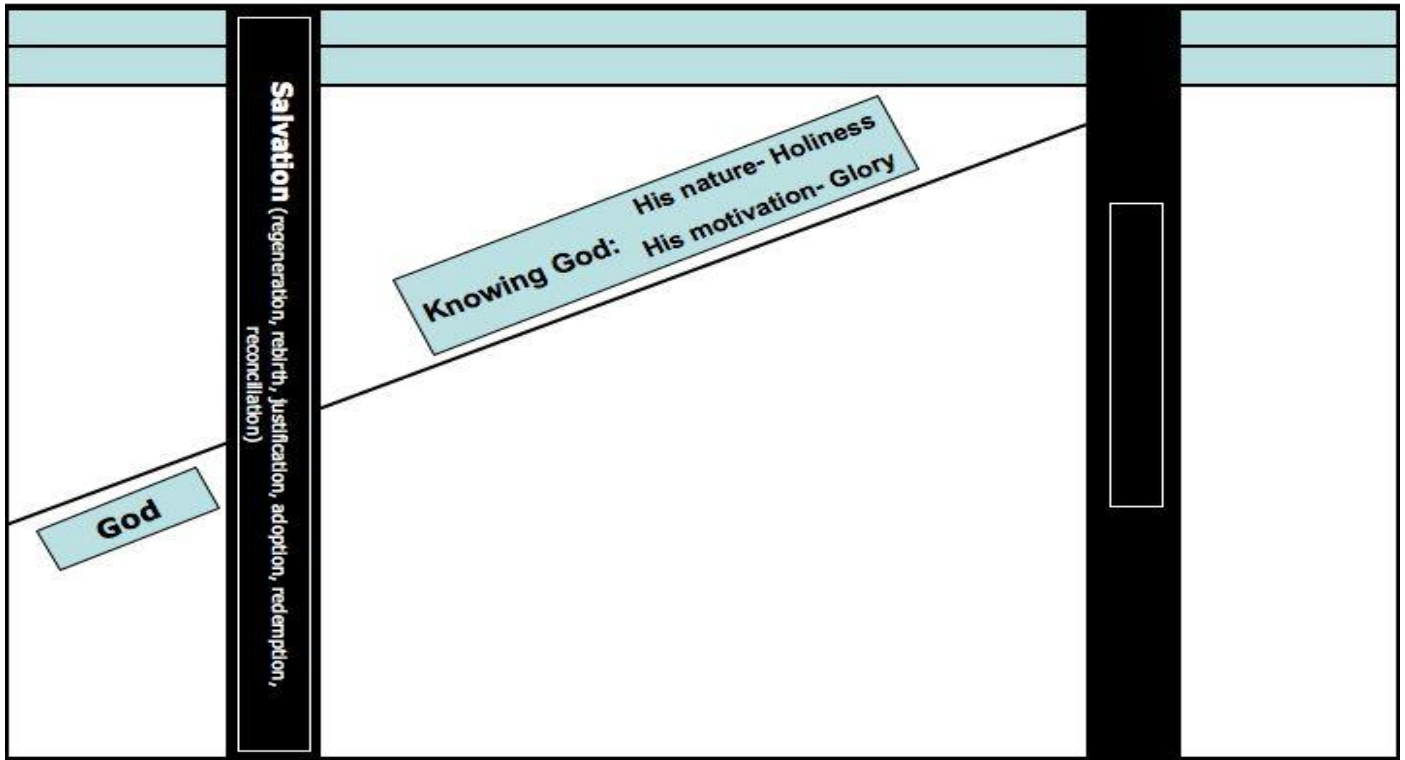

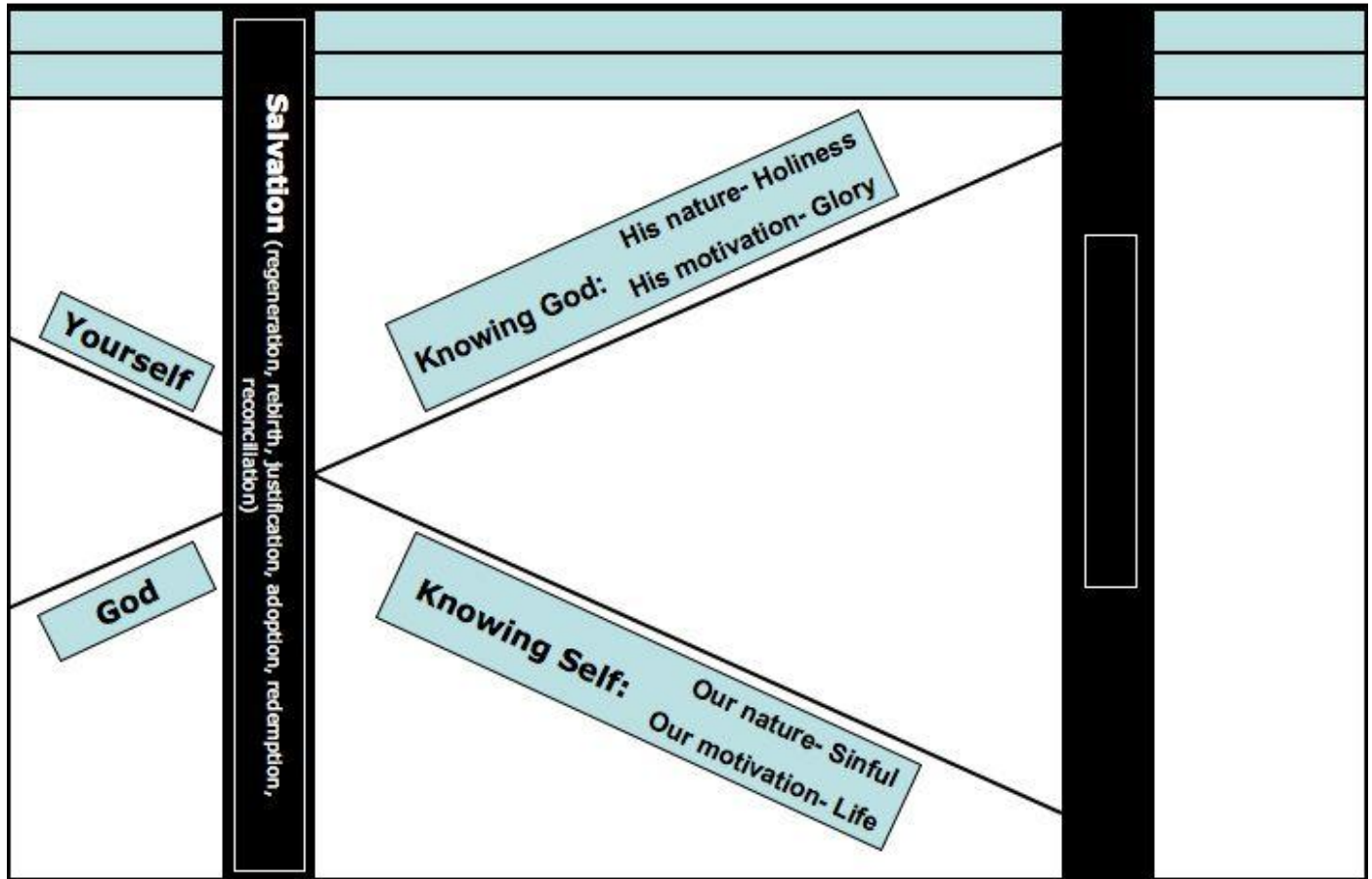

C. OUR NEW NATURE AND SIN

As we have said, now through Christ, we have become children of God. But, as we grow in our understanding of how holy and perfect God is we will see and recognize how sinful we really are (not just in our actions, but in our hearts).

This is a progression of Paul's relationship with God:

Acts 9: → Paul's life-change/conversion

1 Corinthians 15:9 → Paul refers to himself as the least of the apostles.

Ephesians 3:8 → Paul refers to himself as the least of God's people.

1 Tim 1:15 → Paul refers to himself as the worst of sinners.

Did Paul become more sinful as he walked with Christ?

Of course not, God's holiness and his need for grace became a great reality. A growing awareness of sin is a greater understanding of our heart in its natural state. The wonderful thing about this is that although we are desperately sinful, and God is infinitely holy, He accepts us in Christ and views us as His children. This only serves to deepen our appreciation of what Jesus did for us on the cross.

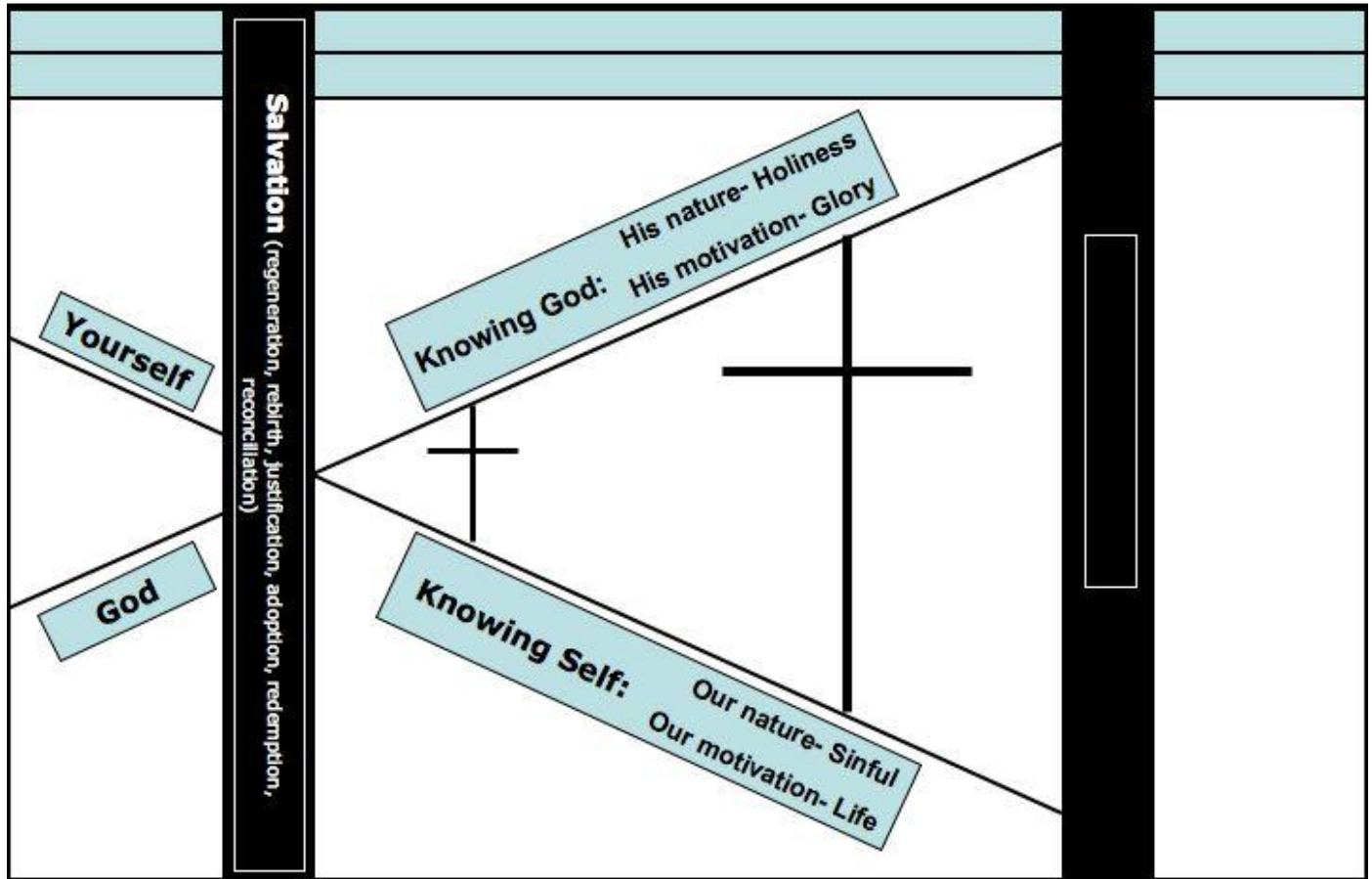

Gospel/ Grace



Introduction:

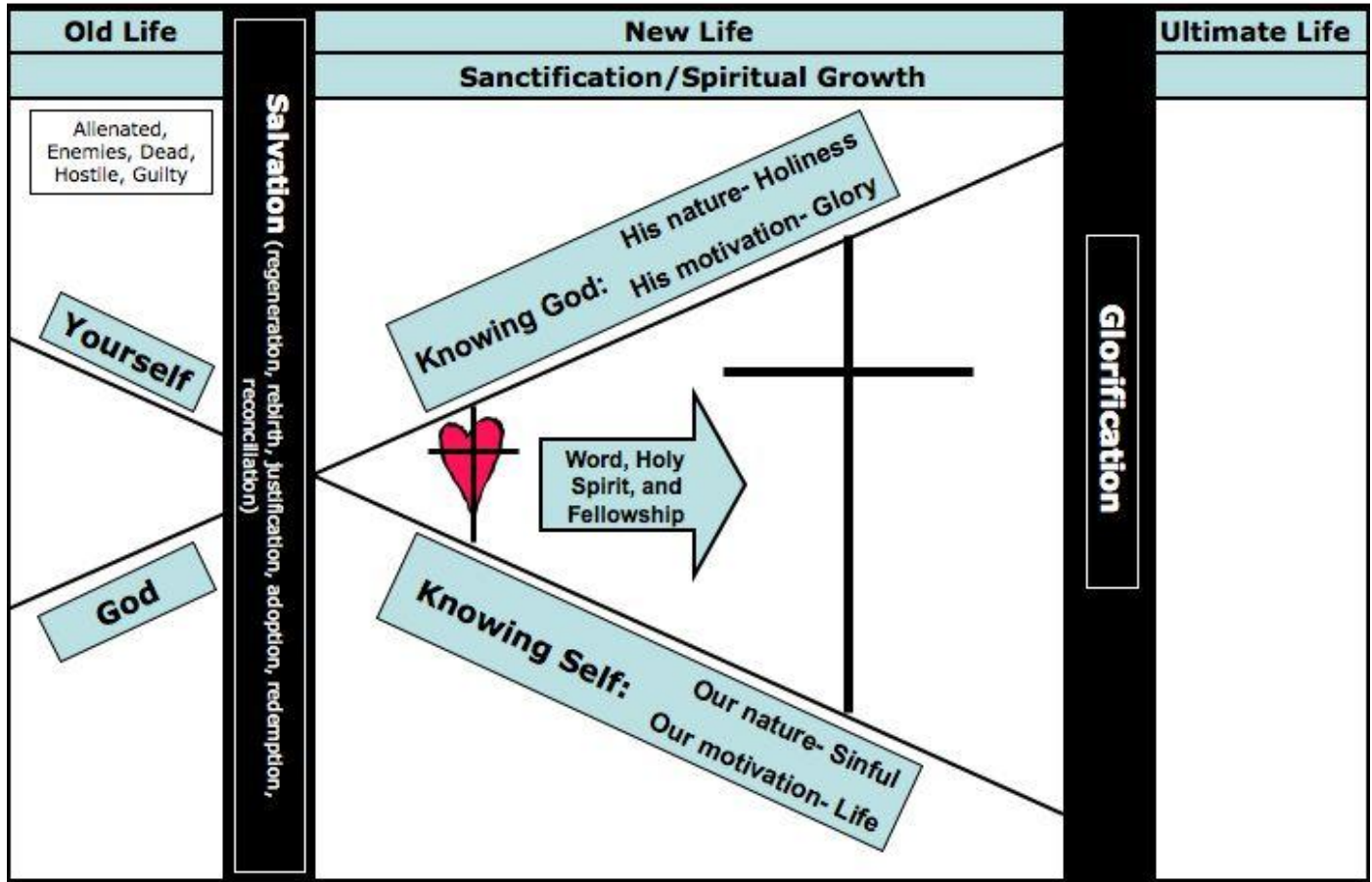

Lesson 6

Our Response to God's Grace



Introduction:

The Christian life is a continual experience of finding God to be more holy, more excellent, and more beautiful than we had ever realized. And at the same time, we are constantly realizing that our sin-sickness runs much deeper than we had ever realized. As we experience these realizations it becomes painfully obvious that the gap between God and ourselves is massive—and seemingly growing all the time! And yet as we see the divide between God and us appear to grow, our experience of God's grace to us (especially in Christ) gets larger and larger. This grace is always enough to cover our ever increasing awareness of the divide between God's holiness and our sinfulness. God's love continues to overflow to us in our weakness.

What are we to do about this? How should we respond? How do we react to our growing awareness that God has done amazing things for us?

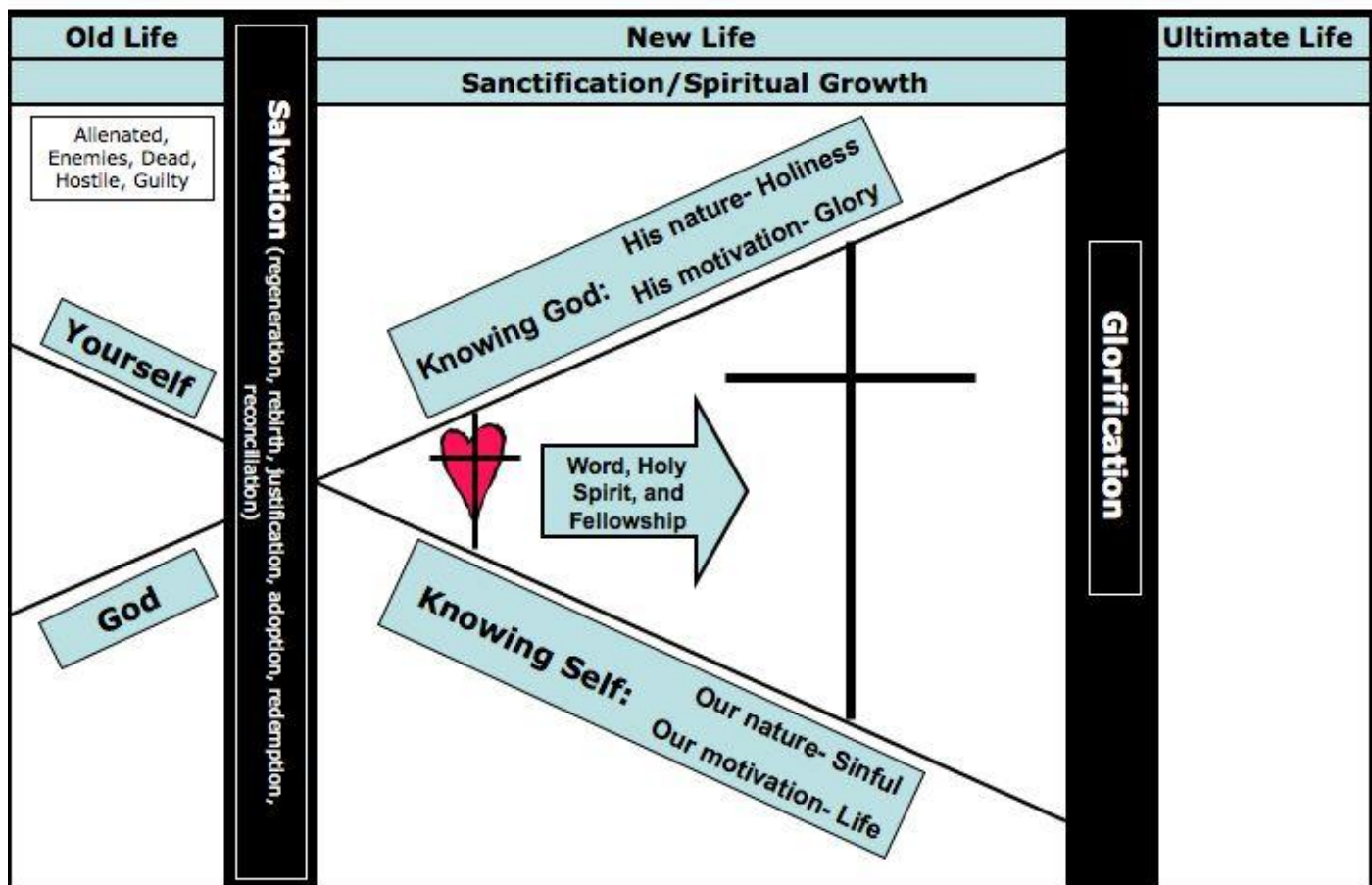

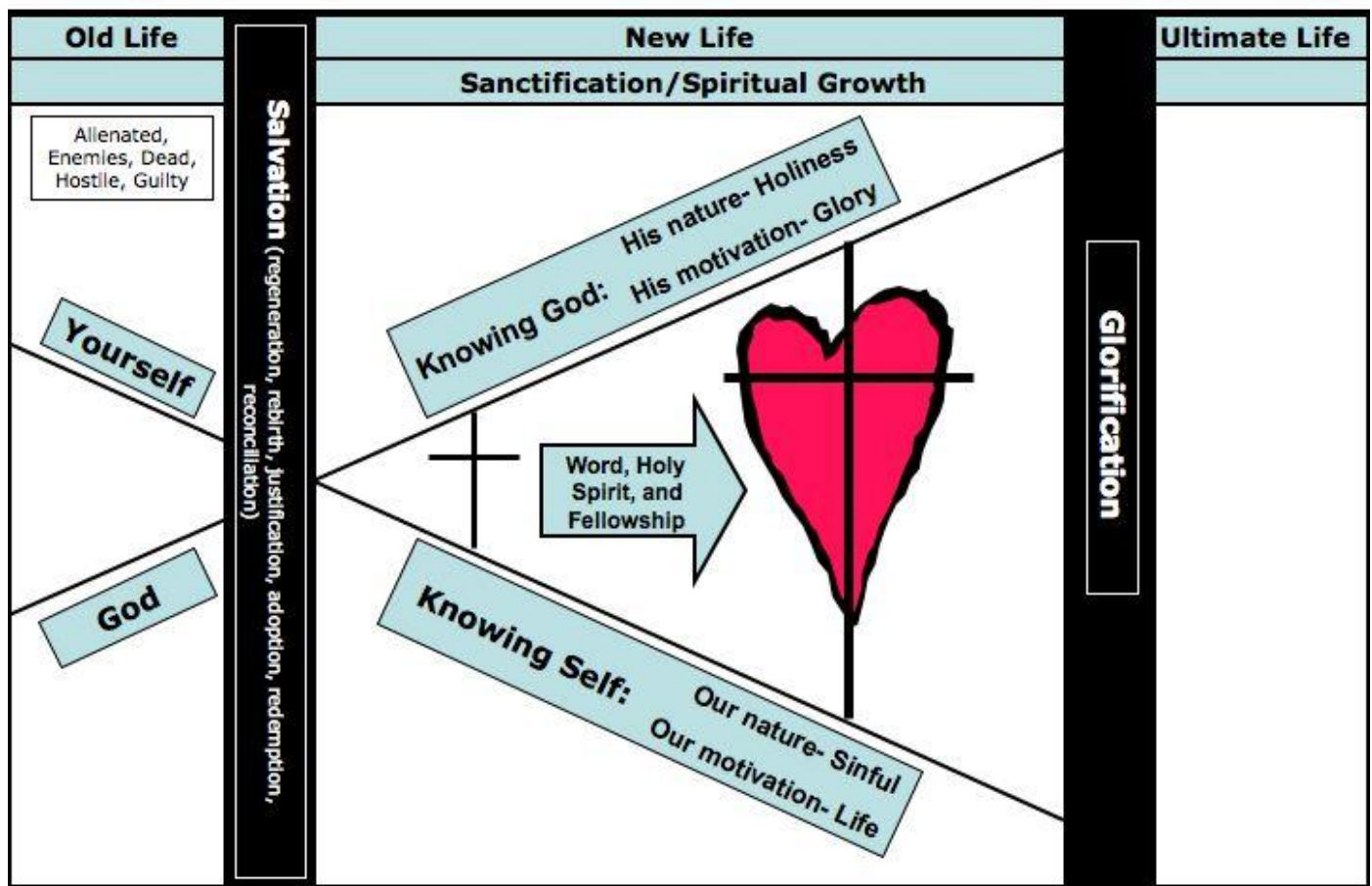
